BOREN, DAVID L

Campaign finance reforms are discussed. The proposed reform bill sponsored by Sen George Mitchell (D-ME) and Sen David Boren (D-OK) addresses the issues of "soft money" and PAC contributions; photo. (L) Mr 6 - 6:2

BORGER, JULIAN (BYLINER)

Zimbabwean President Robert Mugabe is challenged by a former close associate, Edgar Tekere, in the upcoming elections. The presidential and parliamentary elections in Zimbabwe are discussed; map. (L) Mr 28 - 1:3

The Zimbabwe African National Union-Patriotic Front dominated Zimbabwe's recent elections with the result that president Mugabe may try to carry out his long-held plan to create a one-party state; graph. (L) Ap 4 - 4:1

After 26 years of rule, Zambian president Kenneth Kaunda has promised to hold a referendum on his one-party state. Opponents fear the government's control over the process may preclude a fair outcome though; photo. (M) JI 10 - 5:1

BOSTON PHILHARMONIC

The controversial nature of musical performances by the Boston Philharmonic and its conductor, Benjamin Zander, is described. (S) Ja 23 - 10:4

George W. Abbett, 90, an electrical construction business founder and a prominent figure in the industry, died in San Francisco on Aug 6, 1991. (S) Ag 8 - D, 7:2

- Ackerman, Harry S

Television producer Harry Ackerman, who created or helped create the shows "Gunsmoke," "I Love Lucy," and "Leave It to Beaver," died on Feb 5, 1991 at the age of 78. (M) F 6 - B, 6:3

- Anderson, Paul D

Paul D. Anderson, a well-known San Francisco private investigator, gourmet, and expert in capital defense cases, was killed on Apr 1, 1991 at age 45 in a plane crash off the coast of Belize. (M) Ap 6 - C, 10:4

Helen Argyris, one of 15 Californians held hostage for 17 days in 1985 aboard an airplane in Beirut, died Feb 8, 1991 in San Francisco. She was 69; photo. (S) F 11 - B, 6:3

Harry L. Arnold Jr, 79, a physician famous internationally for his expertise in clinical dermatology, died at his home on San Francisco's Presidio Heights on Aug 13, 1991 after a long illness. (S) Ag 14 - A, 20:5

Val Arnold, 64, one of the nation's top interior decorators, died at his Los Angeles home on Aug 15, 1991 of a long, undisclosed illness. (M) Ag 17 - C, 10:4

Charles E. Artman, 52, an activist for civil rights and a prominent member of the hippie movement in the 1960s, died Apr 15, 1991. (S) Ap 25 - B, 6:2

Private services will be held for Robert M. Bacon, retired director and executive vice president of E. F. Hutton & Co, who died on Jan 6, 1991 in San Mateo at the age of 77. (S) Ja 8 - B, 6:4

William Ball, the flamboyant and inspirational stage director who put San Francisco on the American theatrical map and trained a generation of major actors, died Jul 30, 1991 at his home in Los Angeles at the age of 60. The case is being treated as a possible suicide; photo. (L) Ag 1 - D, 6:1

- Baron, Johnny Ace

Nine-year-old Johnny Ace Baron, who was born with the AIDS virus and who lectured to other children about the disease and the dangers of drug abuse, died Dec 25, 1991 of pneumonia in La Jolla CA. (S) D 30 - A, 18:5

- Beck, Simone (Simca)

French cook and cookbook author Simone Beck, 87, died on Dec 20, 1991 at her farmhouse near Cannes France; photo. (S) D 21 - C, 10:1

- Behan, Edward

Edward Behan, a former director of vocations for the Christian Brothers religious order and a former career guidance counselor at St Mary's College, died on Jul 5, 1991 at age 75. (M) JI 8 - D, 6:6

- Benson, Wesley Taft

Wesley Taft Benson, a prominent figure in the Mormon church and a direct descendant of the sect's co-founder, Ezra T. Benson, died at age 83 on May 26, 1991 in Menlo Park CA. (S) My 30 - B, 6:2

- Benvenuto, Elio

Elio Benvenuto, an important figure in the arts in San Francisco, died of respiratory failure on Nov 23, 1991. He was 87. (M) N 26 - D, 6:2

- Berg, Jerry

Jerry Berg, a noted San Francisco attorney, gay leader and civil libertarian, died of AIDS on Sep 26, 1991 in Santa Fe NM, where he moved a year ago. Berg was 54; photo. (M) S 28 - C, 10:1

- Boyajian, Albert

Albert Boyajian, owner of San Francisco's Sears Fine Foods, died on Mar 25, 1991 of lymphoma at age 75. (S) Mr 27 - B, 6:4

- Brainerd, Lawson

A memorial service will be held on Jul 6, 1991 for Lawson Brainerd, a former chief ranger at Muir Woods, at the park where he formerly worked; Brainerd, died on Jun 3, 1991 at age 89. (S) JI 4 - A, 17:4

- Browning, Iben

Iben Browning, 73, the scientist who gained notoriety by predicting that a major earthquake would strike the Midwestern states in Dec 1990, died of a heart attack on Jul 18, 1991 in Albuquerque NM. His prediction did not materialize. (S) JI 20 - A, 6:4

- Bullivant, Virginia Lee

Virginia Lee Bullivant, who worked for the defunct Call Bulletin newspaper as well as the San Francisco Examiner, died Mar 20, 1991 in San Francisco. She was in her early 80s. (M) Mr 24 - B, 7:2

- Buonaccorsi, Al

Al Buonaccorsi, the consulting engineer who was responsible for the mechanical and electrical designs of San Francisco International Airport, died Jul 26, 1991 in San Leandro CA. He was 78. (M) JI 29 - A, 17:4
